

### **Sudbury Shrine Club News**

On June 1, 2008 members of the Sudbury Shrine Club and the Haweater Unit of the Sudbury Shrine Club attended Decoration Day on Manitoulin Island. The Haweater Unit which is composed of Shriners from Manitoulin Island had attended this service and Remembrance Day services for a number of years, parading together with and marching in support of the remaining veterans and placing wreath on behalf of Shriners everywhere.

Today on Manitoulin, instead of laying flowers or flags on individual graves, we lay wreaths in front of the cenotaph to recognize and pay our respects in memory of those who served in the Canadian Forces both in time of war and in peace.

With the conclusion of the service at the main cenotaph, the parade marched across to Memorial Gardens where a wreath was laid in front of the Women's Memorials. The picture below was taken in front of these Memorials.



The history of Decoration Day goes back to April 25, 1866 when, in Columbus, Mississippi, a group of women visited a cemetery to decorate the graves of Confederate soldiers who had fallen in battle at Shiloh. Nearby were the graves of Union soldiers, neglected because they were the enemy. Disturbed at the sight of the bare graves, the women placed some of their flowers on those graves, as well.

In the US, in 1868 the first official Decoration Day or Memorial Day as it soon would be called was held. At that ceremony these words were spoken: "This Memorial Day, on which we decorate their graves with the tokens of love and affection, brings back to our minds in all their vividness the fearful conflicts of that terrible war in which they fell as victims."

On Manitoulin Island, Decoration Day received its start in 1921. Veterans and citizens traveled across the island starting in Wikwemikong in the east and Meldrum Bay in the west, ending at Monument Corners in Spring Bay where a combined service was held. Along the way, they placed flowers and tokens of remembrance on the graves of departed soldiers.

Each year as the ranks of our veterans decrease, the contingent in front of the reviewing stand gets less and less. With the Nobles in Shrine dress jackets and Fez, it added so much. There were numerous compliments from veterans and the public on their presence and how much the Shriners support of the ceremony meant to them.



# Who is eligible for admission to a Shriners Hospital?

Shriners Hospitals accept and treat any child up to their 18th birthday if, in the opinion of the hospital's chief of staff, the child can be helped.

Shriners Hospitals are open to all children without regard to race, religion, or relationship to a Shriner. There is never a charge to the patient, parent, or any third party for any service or medical treat-



ment received at Shriners Hospitals.

# How are admissions handled for burn care at Shriners Hospitals?

The sooner a burned child reaches a Shriners Hospital providing burn care, the better his chances of recovery. In an emergency, the referring physician should telephone the chief of staff at the nearest burn Shriners Hospital and indicate the patient needs emergency care. Non-emergency admissions for reconstructive or plastic surgery should be arranged through the administrator of the nearest burn Shriners Hospital.

The Shriners Hospitals providing burn care are located in Boston, Mass.; Cincinnati, Ohio; Galveston, Texas; and Sacramento, Calif.
