SEPTEMBER 2009 From the District Deputy Brethren, the following states the Grand Master's theme for 2009-2011.

Freemasonry sets *out a five-stage curriculum of Self-discipline: 1) self-examination, 2)* self-discovery, 3) self-analysis, 4) self-realization, 5) self-fulfillment. This is how a good man strives to make himself a better man -abetter citizen, a better family man, a better colleague, and a better workman. We can never forget that every Freemason is someone's living definition of Freemasonry. Let us therefore resolve to act as "the dictates of right reason prompt us" at all times and in all places.


Give Them a Reason for Coming to Lodge,and Masons Will Be There!




