


## Grand Master's Remarks September 2009

### There is still a lingering misapprehension that Freemasonry is a 'secret' society...

Welcome to http://www.grandlodge.on.ca the web site of the Grand Lodge Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Canada in the Province of Ontario. It is maintained by the Communications Committee, V.W. Bro. Robert Kliaman, Chairman, Member of the Board of General Purposes, and the web master is R.W. Bro. James Kirk-White. In the Grand Jurisdiction, which covers 412,582 square miles in the Province of Ontario, there are approximately 50,000 Masons in 570 Lodges administered in 44 Districts. The meeting places for the lodges are found in cities, towns, and villages across the Province. The Grand Lodge of Canada was formed in 1855 at a convention in Hamilton. Our Ritual closely follows English Emulation Ritual, which was adopted in 1855, with very slight modifications introduced in the years since. The offices of the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary are located in the Grand Lodge Memorial Building on King Street West in Hamilton.

There is still a lingering misapprehension that Freemasonry is a 'secret' society, a notion fuelled by writers of popular fiction (Dan Brown) and screenplays (National Treasure). As the reading public eagerly awaits Brown's sequel to The Da Vinci Code reported to reveal secrets concerning President George Washington and the Freemasons, we must bear in mind that Dan Brown is not a Freemason and that he is a writer of fiction, albeit a very clever and successful one. Our meeting places are identified by signage with the Square and Compasses, the well-known symbol of Freemasonry, and they are listed in the telephone directory. Members identify themselves by wearing rings, lapel pins, and placing emblems on their vehicles – hardly hiding our membership.

One of the long established traditions in Freemasonry; no one is ever asked or persuaded to join the fraternity. That is a decision that is strictly personal. If a man is interested in becoming a member, he must first ask a Mason about membership in one of our lodges. The common slogan is To Be One Ask One! Serious inquiries may be directed to this web site by posting a note in the Guest Book giving full contact information. This section is regularly monitored and your inquiry will be responded to.



Lodges throughout the province often hold 'open houses' in our Friend-to-Friend Program when the public is invited to visit a lodge when explanations of our purposes and practises are given by the officers and brethren of the lodge.

I invite you to explore the vast amount of information posted here by the several Committees of Grand Lodge – as the slogan for tourism in Ontario puts it: "Yours to Discover!" I hope that members and visitors may find it interesting, informative and useful to increase your knowledge and enhance your understanding of Freemasonry. We welcome your comments. Please sign our Guest Book. It is always a pleasure to receive fraternal greetings from Brethren around the world. The best way to learn more about Freemasonry, ask a Mason!

On September 2nd the featured column 'Social Studies' by Michael Kesterton in the Globe and Mail, began with this statement: "September has arrived at last, and people are back to doing what they do best: being themselves." It is the season when many of our lodges in Ontario resume regular meetings following the summer recess, 'doing what Masons do best' - studying, learning, and practising their Craft and enjoying the social virtues in an atmosphere of fraternal affection. Cost of Program (continued from page 1)

The cost of running the program is only \$3.00 per child. I believe that with the commitment of our Lodges, individual donations and the assistance of community sponsors we can raise an initial \$6,000 to fund this project for the next two years. This would mean we could provide kits to 2,000 children across the Sudbury-Manitoulin District.

Donations, whether personal, corporate or from a Lodge would go to the Masonic Foundation, **Project #2552**, earmarked to cover the cost of ID kits for the children of Sudbury-Manitoulin District. "Participating Partners" can be recognized in a number of ways. There is a space on the Kit Envelope to identify them, and they can be recognized on posters, etc. Some companies even include a "tag" on their own advertisements: i.e. "A proud supporter of MasoniCh.I.P Ontario, the Masons' Child Identification Program". Tax receipts are issued for all donations.

I ask that each lodge discuss supporting this District Project at their General Purposes meeting during October and come prepared to discuss their degree of involvement and support of the project at the District Meeting on Monday November 2.

### GRAND MASTER'S PROJECT 2009 - 2011

To advance the study and understanding of Freemasonry and to encourage research into the significant impact fraternalism in general and Freemasonry in particular have made on society in Ontario over the last three hundred years, the Grand Master's Project (2009–2011) will establish a fund to create a Centre for Masonic Studies in conjunction with a University in Ontario. In an age when Freemasonry has been fictionalized and trivialized in popular culture, to gain credibility in the academic community would restore the true historical perspective of the fraternity.

This proposed partnership between the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario and Brock University, St. Catharines, would honour the name of **R.W. Bro. Charles A. Sankey** (1905-2009). Dr. Sankey served as Chancellor of the University 1969-1974. A renowned Masonic scholar, he was active in all the concordant bodies of Masonry – Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite (33°), Royal Order of Scotland, Royal Arch Masons. His extensive collection of rare Masonic books and papers is in the Special Collections of the James Gibson Library at Brock, providing a rich resource for research scholars and students. To initiate the project, a series of lectures is planned beginning in the spring of 2010.

All the volunteers are members of Doric Lodge and the bright red vests you see in the picture are thank you gifts from CBS.

We are all very thankful for W. Bro. MacDonald's diligence and hard work and the volunteer efforts of the Doric Lodge members for supporting this great cause.

Healthy people between the ages of 17 and 60 (up to 71 if a person is a regular donor) can donate blood every 56 days. It usually takes about one hour to be registered at the clinic, donate blood, rest, take refreshments and be on your way. ### MasoniCH.I.P..

Child identification program sponsored by the Masonic Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario working with regional and national law enforcement agencies.

### What is the MasoniCH.I.P.?

The MasoniCH.I.P. program uses modern, police-approved techniques to create a child identification kit for the ones you love. The kit collects photos, video, voice recordings, digital fingerprints, dental impressions, saliva swabs as well as traditional statistical information (height, weight, hair and eye colour, etc.)

This information is matched to work seamlessly with Ontario's law enforcement providers. By being so compatible, the critical identifying information can be broadcast and shared more quickly than ever before to assist with the safe recovery of missing children.

The MasoniCH.I.P. program is brought exclusively to families by dedicated Masons and their volunteers, free of charge along with our sentiment that "We hope you never need to use it."

### What's in a MasoniCH.I.P. Kit?

When a child has a kit prepared, their parent or guardian will receive a printed colour data sheet with several ID card inserts, a CD-ROM storing all the digital information, and a sealed bag with the dental plate and cheek swab. All this information is given to the parent or guardian. No information is ever stored by the MasoniCH.I.P. program.

### Elements Attributed to MasoniCH.I.P.:

- A signed permission form is required to participate in the program.
- Events are offered, "At No Cost To Parents" so that anyone wanting their child to participate in the Event can do so, provided they sign a permission form before engaging in the Event.
- All identifying items generated at MasoniCHIP Events are the sole property and given to the individual, child's parent or guardian: are placed in an ID pack along with safety education information and taken home for safe keeping in case the need arises to give law enforcement items to help find a missing person.
- No information of identified individual is to be retained, (except a signed permission form required to participate in the program held by the Masonic Grand Lodge) by any organization or agency involved.
- Events consist of Masons setting up equipment and enlisting volunteers necessary to generate individual <u>Complete ID</u> <u>Packages that contain identifying items.</u> These items are vital to law enforcement agencies in the recovery and identification of missing persons, and aid in the prosecution of perpetrators.

### Identifying Items Include:

- Fingerprints and physical descriptions card.
- Digital still photographs compatible with local Amber Alert requirements for ease of dissemination.
- Brief recorded interview on CD/DVD disc that shows the child's mannerisms, speech pattern and provides details on places they frequent.
- Dental impression generated by qualified volunteers (using Toothprints® wafer) provides a 3-dimentional dental record that can be used for identification.
- DNA sample can be generated from Saliva and cheek skin cells accumulated on the Toothprints® wafer or cheek swab, sealed uncontaminated in a zip-lock bag. This also serves as a scent tracer for scent discriminating tracking dogs to follow.
- Abduction Prevention Education provided to parents and children during the event or as a hand out included inside the ID package, increases public awareness about the risk of abduction or exploitation our children now face in today's society, and provides them with useful safety tips and prevention techniques.



The whole of Canada constitutes a single Scottish Rite Jurisdiction. Here, the term "Scottish Rite" is a short form for "The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of Canada."

Application for membership in the Scottish Rite is open to members in good standing in any Canadian Craft Lodge who are Master Masons. Continued membership in a Craft Lodge is required to maintain good standing in the Scottish Rite.

Acceptance for membership is subject to the usual Masonic conditions of residence, sponsors, investigation, and ballot. Physical impairment is not a disqualification. Belief in a Supreme Being is, as in the Craft degrees, an essential requirement.

The government of the Scottish Rite in Canada resides in <u>the Supreme</u> <u>Council 33°</u> which selects and elects its own membership. It is composed of Sovereign Grand Inspectors-General, 33°, Active Members, (not exceeding 33 in number), plus Past Sovereign Grand Commanders, who are Active Members AD Vitam, and Past Active Members (without vote). Associated with them are Honorary Inspectors-General, 33°, distinguished Brethren selected for their service to the Scottish Rite, to Freemasonry, to their country, or to humanity.

Constituent Bodies are, separately and independently, responsible to Supreme Council for certain degrees. <u>These Constituent Bodies</u> comprise:

- 1. Lodges of Perfection conferring the 4th to 14th degrees, inclusive. It is to one of these lodges that a Master Mason applies for membership. The degrees continue the story of the building of King Solomon's Temple, and amplify and conclude the legend of the Master Mason degree.
- 2. Chapters of Rose Croix conferring the 15th to 18th degrees inclusive. The 15th and 16th degrees relate to the rebuilding of the Second Temple by Zerubbabel. The 17th degree is an approach to, and the 18th degree a recognition of the Christian ethic, but in universal terms, thus assisting in the building, in our hearts, of the Third Temple, not made with hands.
- **3.** Consistories conferring the 19th to the 32nd degrees inclusive. These degrees, often elaborate and highly dramatic, cover a variety of approaches to Masonic teaching. Some have the Crusades as a background. The 30th, 31st and 32nd degrees culminate the teachings of the Scottish Rite, and must be conferred in full ritual form.

#### The Polar Bear

#### What is Dyslexia?

"Dyslexia is a specific learning disability that is neurological in origin. It is characterized by difficulties with accurate and / or fluent word recognition and by poor spelling and decoding abilities. These difficulties typically result from a deficit in the phonological component of language that is often unexpected in relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of effective classroom instruction. Secondary consequences may include problems in reading comprehension and reduced reading experience that can impede growth of vocabulary and background knowledge."







- A Christian, recommended by two members of the Order, who professes a III. belief in the "Christian Doctrine of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of The Father, The Son and The Holy Spirit".

You may request an application from a preceptory in your area.

Roger Kitching from Friendship Lodge No. 691 has been the driving force in organizing and fundraising a team of Masons and their families for many of these years. A special thank you is extended to everyone involved; from the team members to those who so generously supported them. Below is a list of the top research milestones of the past decade that were made possible from these and other C.C.S. fundraising

### Top Research Milestones of the Decade 1999 to 2009

**1999** A Society clinical trial showed that by adding the simple vitamin folic acid to standard treatment for colon cancer, survival could be improved.

**2000** The Society nationally makes the largest contribution to cancer research in its previous history; more than \$43 million. **2001** Two Society researchers discover that a harmless virus might be a powerful cancer fighter. Only years later, clinical trials are underway to test the effectiveness of this virus to treat cancer in patients.

**2002** The Society announces a new research grant to evaluate potential anti-cancer compounds discovered in sea creatures off the coast of British Columbia. Results could uncover a new group of safe and effective agents to treat cancer.

**2003** An announcement by the Society changes how some breast cancers are treated around the world. A Society clinical trial showed that women could reduce their risk of breast cancer recurrence by almost half by taking a drug called letrozole.

**2004** A discovery by a Society researcher shows that a small number of unique cells cause and maintain the growth of some brain cancers. This discovery helps to put Canada at the forefront of research into cancer stem cells.

2005 A Society researcher plays a leading role in the studies proving that the HPV vaccine could prevent cervical cancer in young women.

**2006** The genetic alteration that leads to fatal stomach cancer is discovered by a Society researcher. This breakthrough leads to better prevention and diagnosis with people who have the gene and drastically reduces their chances of dying from cancer. **2007** The Society launches a landmark clinical trial that could change the way prostate cancer is treated in Canada, and around the world.

**2008** A national survey funded by the Society found that young people ignore the risks of sun overexposure. Young adults aged 16 to 24 spend the most time in the sun with the least amount of protection.

**2009** The Society announces the creation of an Occupational Cancer Research Centre in Ontario in partnership with workplace safety and labour groups and the provincial cancer agency; the first of its kind in North America.

South wanted the position because she really enjoys being in the Order of the Eastern Star. "The members who we meet are phenomenal," she said. "I would normally not walk down the street and put my arms around somebody and say 'hello, how are you?' But in the Order of the Eastern Star we do that." South described her colleagues in the Order as lifelong friends who are always there for each other.

As Worthy Grand Matron, South will travel the province visiting various chapters. "There are 18 officers, and as I travel the province a lot of these folks will be traveling with me," South said.

While visiting chapters, South will attend chapter meetings. "When I'm in attendance, I will be given an opportunity to speak to the members of the chapter and I will be bringing some sort of a message," she said. "The message that we're looking to bring this year is friendship."
