


NORFOLK LODGE NO. 10

The General Grand Chapter of the Order of the Be Eastern Star is the governing body over Eastern Star of members world wide. In most jurisdictions such as Ontario, there is a Constitution for which the members are to adhere to, in that jurisdiction. Each Chapter; such as Algoma No. 139 in Sudbury (the largest in Ontario), forms their own set of By-Laws. There are a few Chapters that answer directly to the General Grand Chapter.

The General Grand Chapter meets every three years in a location chosen by the Most Worthy Grand Matron. It may take twelve or more years for the Lady who eventually becomes the M.W.G. Matron to achieve her office, as each office is for a three-year term. This is only achieved after she has served as a Worthy Grand Matron in her jurisdiction. She is expected to visit each jurisdiction during her term as M.W.G.M. These visits would include travel to such places as Australia, the Philippines, Scotland, Mexico, Germany, Italy and Ontario.


Sudbury-Manitoulin District Around and About January 2010

Edward Roblin



Founding Master of Lake Lodge May 1869

Edward Roblin was the son of Owen Roblin, founder of Roblin's Mills, and pioneer milling operator. Born is 1837, and died in 1900.

Edward married Ellen Cotter on October 27th, 1861. They lived in the octagonal house built for them as a wedding gift from Edward's father, Owen. The house was known as the "round house". There was a myth that the "children born in this type of house would have a docile disposition."

Edward and Ellen had four children; Huldah (1863), William H. C. (1865), Donald, and Richard Owen (R.O.)

Edward served as a Justice of the Peace, Clerk of the FOURTH DIVISION Court, and Deputy Reeve of the Township of Ameliasburgh.

Edward was a business man, extensively engaged in the local milling industry. He was one of the Directors for the Agriculture Society (1855), and also the Treasurer, 1871-1875, 1878 – 1900 until he died) for the Ameliasburgh Fair as we know it today.

Disability Awareness: Words Matter



Children with disabilities, like all children, will learn or absorb what they are taught and react to the way they are treated. Every staff member at Shriners Hospitals for Children works hard to build confidence and self-esteem in their patients, and to help them discover and pursue their dreams, despite their disabilities. In working with kids toward that goal, it's important to remember how language can affect a positive attitude.

Words to avoid include "crippled" and "handicapped." Instead of using these words, which can be considered negative, experts suggest using "disability" or the actual term involved, such as "cerebral palsy" or "muscular dystrophy."

When speaking about people with disabilities, clear, direct words are most positively accepted. For example, say, "Johnny uses a wheelchair," instead of, "Johnny is wheelchair-bound," or, "Johnny is confined to a wheelchair." Wheelchairs allow mobility from place to place, which is the opposite of confining.

Words and tone-of-voice can clearly indicate values, and using positive, affirmative words can make a big difference. Practice care when using value-laden words like *courageous, inspiration*,

pity, suffer, tragic, tragedy, afflicted or *victim.* While *courageous* and *inspirational* may seem positive, being labeled as such can be burdensome to a child.

It is also important to use "people-first language." For example, saying, "Johnny is a *child with a disability*," is preferred over saying, "Johnny is a *disabled child*." People with disabilities some times feel isolated from those without disabilities and left out of activities. People-first language is an attempt to encourage understanding that people with disabilities are people first, and to help alleviate fear and encourage inclusion.

Conversation Starters

Here are some ways to start a conversation with a person who has a disability: Say hello; introduce yourself; comment on the weather. Find something you might share an interest in – television, music, sports, anything. In short, begin the same way you would if there were no disability. Take a deep breath, look past the obvious difference, and find the person.

When you speak to people with disabilities as people, you will find yourself in a conversation with someone who has had different experiences, and the exchange of views could be very enriching for both of you.

Try using words that reflect acceptance and indicate that a person is not defined by their disability – a message that is especially imperative to convey to children with disabilities.



Ice Fishing Safety Tips

Let others know exactly where you are going and when you will return.

Before going onto a frozen lake, pond or river, it's important to take safety precautions to reduce the risk of falling through the ice.


Snow cover acts as an insulator and slows down ice formation. Be cautious when ice is covered with snow early in the season and be suspicious of scattered snow patches on presumably safe ice.

Knowing how to judge ice conditions will also help you make more informed decisions while enjoying your outing. Look for clear blue ice. New ice is stronger than old ice. Remember you take a risk any time you go onto the ice. Ice thickness is not consistent. Beware of ice around partially submerged objects such as trees, brush, embankments or structures. Ice will not form as quickly where water is shallow or where objects may absorb sunlight.

When ice fishing, it is always a good idea to drill test holes or use an ice chisel as you venture onto a lake to help judge the thickness and character of the ice.

The general rule of thumb for ice:

- 2 inches or less STAY OFF
- 4 inches of good ice for a walking individual
- 6 inches of good ice for a snowmobile or ATV
- 8-12 inches of good ice for a car or small pickup
- 12-15 inches of good ice for a medium pickup truck.



When on the ice attach a long cord to your sled. Not only does this make the sled easier to pull but should someone fall through the ice you can push the sled to them holding onto the line. Carry two picks - spikes protruding from wooden hand holds - to help pull your way out if you should fall in. If you should fall through the ice, once you spike your way out or are pulled out, don't stand - roll across the ice in the direction you came. Carry a floating seat cushion. It'll add to your seating comfort and give you something throw to someone fallen through.

Keep your auger covered. The blades are sharp, and can easily cut you, your dog or your children.

Spray vegetable oil on your auger and snowshoes. Snow won't stick and you won't cut yourself cleaning off the show.

Wear creepers. Slip on, or spiked shoes will keep you from slipping and falling on the ice.

What if I fall in?

- Try not to panic.
- Turn toward the direction you came.
- The safest place to pull yourself back up is the last place you stepped before you went through the ice.
- Place your hands and arms on the unbroken surface of the ice.
- Work your way up by kicking your feet.
- Use your ice picks to assist in pulling yourself onto the ice.
- Once you are lying on the ice, roll away from the weak or broken ice, don't attempt to stand up.

What if my buddy falls through thin ice

- Keep calm, have a plan. DO NOT RUN OUT TO ASSIST THE VICTIM. You can go from rescuer to victim in a short second.
- Reach the victim with a long pole, board, rope, extension cord, blanket, jumper cables ...
- Throw the victim a life jacket, empty water jug, or other buoyant object
- Build a human chain in which rescuers lie on the ice with each person grasping the feet of the person in front.
- Once on the ice, roll away from the weak or broken ice, do not attempt to stand up.

Treat hypothermia victim by removing wet clothing and replacing it with dry clothing. Get medical assistance - people who have been in cold water may seem fine at first but may suffer potential life threatening effects when the cold blood starts to circulate through the body from the extremities.
