
My Brethren: I am writing this just after watching our Canadian Ladies Curling team win their semi-final match and after an evening of watching our women win four more Olympic medals. What a fabulous outpouring of support for and pride in the accomplishments of our athletes, in particular for the women athletes who are dominating the platform for Canada. What a thrilling, emotional week this has been.

What a thrilling, emotional week this has been. So many wonderful stories of athletes overcoming adversity and all odds to just be there to compete, let alone win a medal.

At an earlier Official Visit, I quoted from the research which a group of Toronto area Masons did on the "Condition of Masonry in Ontario". A few years ago, they reported that, taking into account initiations and deaths, approximately 20,000 Masons had left the Craft in Ontario. It made me was curious about our statistics here in the Sudbury-Manitoulin District and I did my own research. On March 3, at my Official Visit to Nickel Lodge I will present my findings. At this time, from the eight variables available for each lodge, I will give you one raw, total statistic. As of Dec. 31, 1993 our District reported a total membership of **1,219** Masons, fifteen years later on Dec. 31, 2008 (the most recent data available) our membership was 916, **a decrease in total membership of 303 or 25%.**

If lodges are looking at ways to retain members, to make lodge more interesting and more relevant, to bring more brethren into the craft, you do not have to reinvent the wheel. Grand Lodge has a number of programs and initiatives, which have a proven background of success. On Tuesday, March 23 at Belrock Masonic Center, a team from the Grand Lodge Resources Committee will present an overview of these programs and how best to implement them. In the following months, it is my hope that, as participants return with new ideas, lodges will take advantage of some of the different opportunities presented that evening.

In closing, I wish to commend Espanola Lodge on, once again, hosting such a warm and inviting Masonic Bonspiel. My congratulations are extended to the members of the organizing committee, in particular, the chair W. Bro. Doug Bracken. Great fellowship prevailed, with prizes being presented to every competitor. 



George Chambers is a quiet gentle man. When he speaks, it is with the authority and precision which draws on his years of experience. He is a devoted lover of Masonry who takes the responsibility of passing on the Masonic tradition intact very seriously. We are all aware of those facts, so hopefully we can shed some light here on the family man and the teacher he has been as well. George was born April 1st 1921 in Toronto and resided at 348 Concord Avenue where he attended three local schools, then later a technical school, where he developed





It deals with the building of King Solomon's Temple and the various craftsmen employed. But its real message is one of contemplation of human strengths and weaknesses.

The degree contains many lessons for the discerning mason and illustrates that the wisest of men can be mistaken: that experts are often wrong: that the weakest often display perseverance better than the strongest: and, that we all have a part to play in the building of life. It is for each to put his own interpretation on the message that the degree proclaims, but there is a clear encouragement that no man is beyond redemption and that the possibility of distinction is always within our power.

The York Rite gives an elaboration on the teachings of the Masonic Lodge. It is divided into several bodies including the Holy Royal Arch, and the Preceptory.

The Holy Royal Arch

On your journey through the three degrees of Masonry, you would have learned the proficiency lecture for each degree Many questions would have arisen concerning the meaning of the ceremonies, the historical implications and the 'why' of the legends of Freemasonry.

Most students of Freemasonry agree that the story of the Craft as presented in the three degrees is incomplete and that the degrees offered in the Holy Royal Arch of the York Rite of Freemasonry complete the story and answer many of the questions in the mind of the newly made Master Mason. In the Holy Royal Arch of Jerusalem is found the essentials of symbolism and philosophy necessary for a Master Mason to understand that which he has received.

Team History: Around the year of 1948 a group of Oklahoma Indians that got together to put on some Masonic Degree work. It was very well received by those who witnessed the effort. In 1952, part of the 1948 group decided to form the Oklahoma Masonic Indian Degree Team to commemorate the centenary of the death of Cherokee Bro. Will Rogers. The team consists of 15 active members, 11 of which are Past Masters. It is made up of members from several Oklahoma lodges. Nine recognized tribes are represented: Apache, Cherokee, Choctaw, Comanche, Creek, Eucha, Oneida, Osage, Seminole, and ("Sycamore").

All the Brothers must live in the State of Oklahoma and be willing to travel two and occasionally three weekends a month, if the Team can travel from Tulsa to a Lodge in an hour, we will work weeknights. This amount of travel time during a year can be stressful on home life, but we have a very supportive "home team". On occasion, the "home team" gets to "go on the road"; that is to say the wives of the Team get invited to visit when the ladies of the Lodge members for whom the Team is doing the Degree work. Every year since, the Team has traveled all over the United States and Europe to put on the Maser Mason Degree. The Team has never charged for their work and *will not* do mock Degrees.

One of their largest degrees put on was in Delaware with approximately 4,500 brethren present. The beautiful work they perform is authorized with dispensation from the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma. It is through this fellowship that many long-standing

It is through this fellowship that many long-standing friendships, for both the members and the wives, have been built. Team members genuinely enjoy getting to know their Brethren from other states and finding kindred spirits in Masonry.



This is "The oldest Degree Team" in existence today, and mostly that is because as a Team the group has never stopped or had a break since inception - over fifty year ago. The OMIDT have raised over 900 to the Master Mason Degree.

Since the early 60's the Team has had picture postcards available as a memento of their degree work. The donations received through these help to pay for their travels. Lately, they have added lapel pins, ball caps, and coins as another souvenir. When the Team travels out of state, they ask the requesting Lodge pay for travel, food and lodging. In recent years, members of the Team have put on a traditional Indian dance programs and Story telling of legends and tales to help some of the Lodges defray part of the cost of their travel. This has been a favourite, not only of the Lodge members, but also their ladies and family members. This is the only time that the ladies and children can see the Team members in their authentic tribal regalia or dance clothes. The Team often visits the Shrine hospitals located near the Degree work. They enjoy their talks with the kids and staff, and perform their dance programs for them.

STORAGE TIPS:

Vidalia Onions have a higher water and sugar content than storage onions making them susceptible to bruising and must be handled with care. The key to keeping your Vidalia Onions is to keep them cool, dry and separate. There are several favourite methods of storage:

- Ø In the refrigerator, wrapped separately in foil. Although expensive and takes up precious space, this will preserve your onions for as much as a year.
- Ø In the legs of old, clean sheer pantyhose. Tie a knot between each onion, and when you want an onion just cut above the knot. Hang in a cool, dry and well-ventilated area.
- Ø On racks or screens. Make sure the onions do NOT TOUCH, and then store them in a cool, dry area.
- Ø Vidalia Onions can also be frozen. Chop and place on a cookie sheet until frozen. Then place in a freezer container and seal. This allows you to remove only the amount you want, when you want. Or freeze whole. Jumbo Vidalia Onions can be peeled, washed, cored and dropped into a plastic freezer bag. Once frozen they can be removed like ice cubes. Freezing changes the onion's texture so they can be used only for cooking. Whole frozen onions can also be baked in the oven.

Onions are recognized as an excellent source of Vitamin C and Dietary Fibre.


