

Dr. Ray Wiss is recognized across Canada and internationally as the man who introduced ultrasound into Canadian emergency medical practice. His teachings have reached several thousand Canadian emergency physicians and this has transformed the way emergency medicine is practiced in our country. He has been described as being the most influential emergency physician in Canada in the past decade.

Because of his prior military background, Dr. Wiss followed the deployment of Canadian troops in Afghanistan very closely. The more he heard and read, the more he became convinced that the Canadian Forces's mission in Afghanistan

Captain Ray Wiss Forces's mission in Afghanistan was an example of a very rare thing: a moral war. He therefore re-enlisted with the Canadian Forces for the express purpose of supporting the Afghan mission.

Dr. Wiss, now Captain Wiss, arrived in Afghanistan in early November of 2007. He quickly integrated himself into the medical team, who had been unaware to that point about his former service in the combat arms. Upon learning of this, they asked him if he would be willing to undertake a much more dangerous mission than the one to which he had originally been assigned: to serve at the Forward Operating Bases where the fighting takes place. Captain Wiss agreed to do so, and ended up spending more time in the combat area than any other physician since the Afghan mission began.

FOB Doc: A Doctor on the Front Lines in Afghanistan is a formal publication of the diary Captain Wiss kept during his time in Afghanistan.

Since returning from Afghanistan, Dr. Wiss has continued to teach nationally and internationally, and re-joined the team at the Sudbury Regional Hospital Emergency Department. He lives in Sudbury with his wife and their daughter.

Ark Mariners degree was conferred on Brothers Willi Glehs, Paul Forbes and Jim Angus on Saturday, November, 20th 2010


This degree is based upon the story of Noah and his ark. The presiding officer of a Royal Ark Mariner lodge, the Commander, represents Noah, and the Senior and Junior Warden his sons Shem and Japheth. The ritual emphasizes the cardinal virtues, using the triangle and the working tools with which Noah built the ark - axe, saw, and auger - to point the moral lesson.

The principal emblems of the degree are the triangle, rainbow, and a dove with an olive branch in its beak. The earliest record of the degree being worked comes in Bath in 1790. Today in our Jurisdiction, Royal Ark Mariner lodges are "moored" to most Councils – due to the long distances between Councils Select Masters who receive the Royal Ark Mariner Degree may then wear the "Rainbow" jewel.

V. W. Brother John Edmund Gamble Algonquin Lodge No. 536 Biography Of A Man Born To Be A Mason

John Gamble was born May 20, 1939, which his mother used to remind him, was the day the Queen came to visit Sudbury. John has been married to his wife Beverley (her family name is Wright) for fortysix years and they have two children, Brent and Jean. Thev have two grandchildren, Angel (21

V.W. Bro. J. E. Gamble years old) and Joshua (18 years old). John attended Central Public School, then Prince Charles (now Ecole Vanier) and finished at Sudbury High School. He feels it is a bit ironic that the site of the Sudbury Arena is exactly where his old school was situated. His school days were highlighted by the winter of 1946-46 when the snow was so deep he had to sit on the shoulders of one of the senior students in order to see over the snow that had accumulated

He and his wife are members of St. Andrew's United Church for 46 years. John has served as Church Council Secretary for 16 Years and also Director and Secretary of the Board of Directors of St. Andrew's Place (The First Multipurpose Seniors and Church Complex of its kind in Canada) for fifteen years and still in that position.

John started his career working at the Cochrane Dunlop Retail Hardware in 1950. He then went to work at International Nickel (INCO) from 1958 to 1994 where he retired in 1994. He worked at the Sudbury Arena as After Hours Box Office Supervisor for 31 Years.

His Masonic career has been 50 years long with a very broad participation, where he has been involved in many bodies, which has offered a rich experience with most of our Members in this District and in the Province as a whole.

Masonry, for the Gambles, is a affair. John's brothers family Thomas and David are Masons as well. John said his father took him to the Temple in Copper Cliff where he was initiated into Algonquin Lodge #536 six months after his twenty-first birthday.

He was passed to the Second Degree, March 14, 1961 and Raised to the Third Degree May 30, 1961. Installed on June 13, 1995 as Worshipful Master of Algonquin Lodge #536 by the late R.W. Bro. Alex Gray. John was appointed lodge Chaplain in 1997 and served until 2005. W Bro. John Gamble has served as Assistant Secretary of Algonauin Lodge from 2005 until the present.

He has completed the College of Freemasonry DDGM Course and served as District Secretary of the Sudbury-Manitoulin District 2005-06. He also served as Grand Steward of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario in 2006-07.

In 1961, John was advanced to the Mark Master Mason Degree in the Tuscan Chapter #95 and received Most Excellent Master and later, Exalted HRA Degree in the same Chapter. In 1986, he became First Principal and again in 1987. From 1990 to 2000 he was Scribe "E" for Tuscan Chapter #95. During 2000, John became Grand Superintendent of New Ontario District #15 and in 2001, he became Grand Representative to the State of Rhode Island and the Plantations (currently).

In 1980, John gained Membership in the Royal and Select Masters (Cryptic) and became a Royal Master of the Alpha Council #23 in Sudbury. In 1981, he became Select Master and later in 1981, Super Excellent Master and in 1990, Thrice Illustrious Master of Alpha Council #23; in 1993, Grand Steward of the Royal and Select Masters of Ontario. During 2000, he became Chaplain, a post he holds to this day. In 1996, he became the Grand Representative to the State of New Mexico (currently) and in 1998, Charter Member of Abitibi Council #28 in Iroquois

In 1999, John was Anointed, Consecrated, Set Aside in the Elam Council #5 of The Order Of The High Priesthood of Ontario in Espanola and was President of the Elam Council in 2006. Since 2008, John has been Recorder for Elam Council.

John was Initiated into the Royal Ark Mariners Lodge in 1982 (Nipissing Council #20 Sudbury) and in 1988 he became Worshipful Commander Noah of Nipissing Council #20. In 1990, he was awarded the Order of The Silver Trowel. Ontario Council.

John has been a Member of the Knights Templar (Sovereign Great Priory of Canada) since 1962, with the Order of the Red Cross and Malta Orders, Mavar Preceptory, #65 (Sudbury), Consecrated in 1962, Presiding Perceptor in 1971 and 1980, then Provincial Grand Prior of Algoma District #11 in 1985 and Chaplain for 15 years and is still currently in that post as well as Order of the Temple Novice and Consecration, Prior for 16 years and Installing Preceptor for 31 years...

John is a Member of the Knights of the York Cross of Honour, where he was Knighted into Trent Priory #74, Peterborough, in 1997. he is also a Member of The York Rite Sovereign College of North America. He is a Charter Member of the York Rite Sovereign College of North America as Knight of York Excalibur College #101 (Sudbury). John is Secretary currently and has been since the College was Constituted. In 1992, he received the Distinguished Service Award.

John has been a Member of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, since 1990, Sudbury Lodge Of Perfection. Six months later, North Bay Chapter of Rose Croix, then Barrie Consistory for his 32nd Degree.

He was a Member of the Ramses Temple (Toronto) Shriners' (AAONMS) for 40 years and 38 years in the Order of the Eastern Star, Algoma Chapter #139. In 1981-82 he was Worthy Patron.

John's dedication to Masonry and all the many associated groups his is a member of is exemplified within this record quoted above. The posts he has taken on mostly show a willingness to be the hard worker who is often the glue, which holds the group together.

John did not indicate his chore that he performs regularly in all the Lodges as the Photographer who records almost every Installation and most Degrees for the Masters and Officers.

John has had a long history with the Sudbury Arena and before that at the Queen's Athletic Field so a lot of people recognize him from those days. Through the years, he has met a lot of celebrities, seen a lot of games with many teams, ice shows, circuses, rock shows, and rodeos. One rodeo that stands out in his mind is the one where he met

a Brahma bull up close and personal.

The bull had escaped his pen overnight and John was on a tour getting ready to close up. He was startled to say the least. John has a portrait that Vince Theriault did of him. He pictured John standing guard over the money at the Arena, with a sword in hand. He remembers fondly working with people like Joe Spence who reported the games at Queen's Athletic Field and Bill Keayes taking tickets at the Field. He worked for several years at the Sudbury Arena when Bob King was Manager.

Does anyone remember the "Silver Six" softball players? His memories of those days include riding to work with Cy McLeod, who was a local Police Officer back when John worked at Inco, in the back of his Police cruiser. He picked John up and dropped him off at work for a long while.

John has suffered for many years with problems with his legs swelling and causing a lot of pain. He is going for an appointment soon with a surgeon to see if there is something they can do to give him some relief and, hopefully, a cure. His wife suffers from severe arthritis and so they

are limited by the difficulty of a great deal of pain. This has not stopped John in his contribution to Masonry, which he still works at diligently.

John is an enthusiastic photographer and enjoys using his computer. He likes music and listens to music when he can.

Lodge secretaries make Lodges function efficiently, so that the Lodge masters can direct their Lodges with a minimum of difficulty. John has often served as Secretary in the various bodies related to Masonry and thereby has made it possible for those to function as they should.

My hope is that we can have a clearer understanding of the man who is often behind the scenes and whose participation facilitates ours.



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Ice Fishing Safety Tips

Let others know exactly where you are going and when you will return.

Before going onto a frozen lake, pond or river, it's important to take safety precautions to reduce the risk of falling through the ice.

Snow cover acts as an insulator and slows down ice formation. Be cautious when ice is covered with snow early in the season and be suspicious of scattered snow patches on presumably safe ice.

Knowing how to judge ice conditions will also help you make more informed decisions while enjoying your outing. Look for clear blue ice. New ice is stronger than old ice. Remember you take a risk any time you go onto the ice. Ice thickness is not consistent. Beware of ice around partially submerged objects such as trees, brush, embankments or structures. Ice will not form as quickly where water is shallow or where objects may absorb sunlight.

When ice fishing, it is always a good idea to drill test holes or use an ice chisel as you venture onto a lake to help judge the thickness and character of the ice.

The general rule of thumb for ice:

- 2 inches or less STAY OFF
- 4 inches of good ice for a walking individual
- 6 inches of good ice for a snowmobile or ATV
- 8-12 inches of good ice for a car or small pickup
- 12-15 inches of good ice for a medium pickup truck.



When on the ice attach a long cord to your sled. Not only does this make the sled easier to pull but should someone fall through the ice you can push the sled to them holding onto the line. Carry two picks - spikes protruding from wooden hand holds - to help pull your way out if you should fall in. If you should fall through the ice, once you spike your way out or are pulled out, don't stand - roll across the ice in the direction you came. Carry a floating seat cushion. It'll add to your seating comfort and give you something throw to someone fallen through.

Keep your auger covered. The blades are sharp, and can easily cut you, your dog or your children.

Spray vegetable oil on your auger and snowshoes. Snow won't stick and you won't cut yourself cleaning off the show.

Wear creepers. Slip on, or spiked shoes will keep you from slipping and falling on the ice.

What if I fall in?

- Try not to panic.
- Turn toward the direction you came.
- The safest place to pull yourself back up is the last place you stepped before you went through the ice.
- Place your hands and arms on the unbroken surface of the ice.
- Work your way up by kicking your feet.
- Use your ice picks to assist in pulling yourself onto the ice.
- Once you are lying on the ice, roll away from the weak or broken ice, don't attempt to stand up.

What if my buddy falls through thin ice

- Keep calm, have a plan. DO NOT RUN OUT TO ASSIST THE VICTIM. You can go from rescuer to victim in a short second.
- Reach the victim with a long pole, board, rope, extension cord, blanket, jumper cables ...
- Throw the victim a life jacket, empty water jug, or other buoyant object
- Build a human chain in which rescuers lie on the ice with each person grasping the feet of the person in front.
- Once on the ice, roll away from the weak or broken ice, do not attempt to stand up.

Treat hypothermia victim by removing wet clothing and replacing it with dry clothing. Get medical assistance - people who have been in cold water may seem fine at first but may suffer potential life threatening effects when the cold blood starts to circulate through the body from the extremities.
