



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COVID-19 Update from our District Grand Master



Grand Lodge of A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario **Grand Master**

Sept. 24, 2021

Brethren,

In the summer we had great hopes for a return to our labours in the fall. Since then vaccination rates have stagnated, the pandemic has reared its ugly head in Western Canada, and restrictions have not been lifted in Ontario. We do not know when the Province will move into its Exit Step. Our public health officials have consistently said that even those who are fully vaccinated should continue to wear masks, physically distance, and LIMIT THEIR SOCIAL CONTACTS.

Freemasons are committed to doing what is best for society and Grand Lodge has always kept the health and safety of our members at the forefront of our thoughts. Meeting in person is not essential to Masonry – we can stay connected in so many other ways, so we are extending the moratorium on in-person meetings. How long is up in the air, dependent on vaccination rates, level of infection in the community and government regulations.

For planning purposes we have now extended the moratorium on in-person Masonic gatherings, including memorial services, until January 1, 2022.

We continue to monitor all developments in health and safety regulations and if the situation changes before then, we will re-evaluate.

Outdoor social gatherings will still be allowed if they follow all the government regulations for Step 3, which include a written safety plan, signage about symptom screening, attendance lists for contact tracing, cleaning protocols, size limits and physical distancing. More if food is served.

A reminder that graveside services are not allowed by Grand Lodge.

Lodges and Districts are encouraged to continue to use available telecommunications technologies for education, social interaction, and, if needed, discussion of lodge business within the parameters that have been set up. If your lodge has not used these before, please contact your DDGM for details.

The expression, "The Magic of Freemasonry," takes on a different meaning when one realizes the great number of professional and amateur magicians who are and have been members of the Ancient Craft. It was only natural that these skilled performers of the art of producing baffling effects and illusions should band together to share their interests with the Fraternity.

In the strictest sense of the word, Lodge, "the Invisible Lodge" is not actually a Lodge. It is an international organization of Freemasons who also have as their vocation or avocation - MAGIC. The Invisible Lodge was formed in 1953 by Sir Felix Korim of England, who served as the organization's first President. Membership in The Invisible Lodge has been accorded to more than 800 selected Masons throughout the world, including such notable and well-known figures in pictured below.

Joined by the common bond of magic, these Brethren who may be or have been professional entertainers, hobbyists, collectors or students of both magic and Freemasonry, combine those interests to produce the organization known as "The Invisible Lodge."

The Origins of Canadian Thanksgiving!

The origins of Canadian Thanksgiving are more closely connected to the traditions of Europe than of the United States. Long before Europeans settled in North America, festivals of thanks and celebrations of harvest took place in Europe in the month of October. The very first Thanksgiving celebration in North America took place in Canada when Martin Frobisher, an explorer from England, arrived in Newfoundland in 1578. He wanted to give thanks for his safe arrival to the New World. That means the first Thanksgiving in Canada was celebrated 43 years before the pilgrims landed in Plymouth, Massachusetts!

Another reason for Canadian Thanksgiving arriving earlier than its American counterpart is that Canada is geographically further north than the United States, causing the Canadian harvest season to arrive earlier than the American harvest season. And since Thanksgiving for Canadians is more about giving thanks for the harvest season than the arrival of pilgrims, it makes sense to celebrate the holiday in October. So what are the differences between Canadian and American Thanksgiving, other than the date? Not much! Both Canadians and Americans celebrate Thanksgiving with parades, family gatherings, pumpkin pie and a whole lot of turkey!

All about Canadian Halloween!

Halloween is observed annually on the night of 31 October. It is believed to have originated primarily as a Celtic celebration marking the division of the light and dark halves of the year, when the boundary between the living and the dead was believed to be at its thinnest. Halloween customs, such as wearing disguises to ward off ghosts and offering food to appease malevolent spirits, were brought to Canada in the mid-to-late 1800s by Irish and Scottish immigrants. North America's first recorded instance of dressing in disguise on Halloween was in Vancouver, British Columbia, in 1898, while the first recorded use of the term trick or treat was in Lethbridge, Alberta, in 1927. Halloween became increasingly popular with adults beginning in the 1990s and by 2014 was estimated to be a \$1-billion industry in Canada, making it the second most commercially successful holiday behind Christmas.



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
