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## TIME TO GET SERIOUS ABOUT WINTER!

One of the most pressing and vital issues and concerns on everyone's mind is "When can we get on with Winter???" . This burden falls heaviest on the young who will, no doubt, receive new ice skates and hockey gear for Christmas.

With local playground rinks a distant memory from last season, and ponds and rivers strictly off limits for now, and local ice arenas not so local for an 8 year old with no money, a quick fix, and possibly the only option is a backyard rink.

Once you know how and with some practice along with some trial and error you can create an ice rink of Olympic quality and the envy of your neighbours. Just by following a few easy steps.

First of all it is best to start with a perfectly flat backyard area. This will save both water and time! Even with a 1% grade one side of your rink could be as much as 3 inches deeper than the other, and consequently require a lot more water to fill it.

Second, clear the selected area of snow, ice and debris. Bank the snow around the edges.

Third, after waiting for the ideal temperature - between minus 15 degrees Celsius and minus 20 degrees Celsius cover the cleared area with heavy duty plastic. Overlap the joins by about 6 to 9 inches. Hold down the outer edges with chunks of snow or ice.

Fourth, and now the real work begins. Obtain one or two (or more) plastic 45 gallon drums. These are usually available from outlets like Evans Lumber. (Two or three drums are better than one). Position these barrels on the rink area and fill them with cold water. You will probably have to hook the hose up to a tap inside the house, and after you have filled the barrels you almost certainly will need to coil the hose and take it inside otherwise the water inside it will freeze.



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## TIME TO GET SERIOUS ABOUT WINTER!

I have found that the best temperature for rink building is around minus 15 degrees Celsius and minus 20 degrees Celsius, or colder. However, much colder may drive you beyond your comfort zone. There is nothing meaner than a frost bitten rink maker.

Now for a quick lesson in physics. When a liquid freezes it must lose any heat that is stored in its mass. To start with, your water is around 40 degrees Fahrenheit or 5 or 6 degrees Celsius. So to get the temperature down to freezing, one BTU (British Thermal Unit) per pound of water per degree drop (in metric 1 calorie per kilogram) must be removed to achieve the freezing point or freezing temperature. That's a lot of heat - you do the math and compare how much heat your furnace puts out! Once you have removed the heat from the water and before it can change to ice there is a phenomena called "heat of fusion" to contend with. That is - "how much heat must be removed (or added) to change the liquid to a solid (or vice versa). For water it is 144 BTU's per pound (or 80 calories per kilogram). So at its freezing point water remains a liquid until even more heat is removed.

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Fifth - so.....now that you have filled your barrels with water - evening time is usually best, you must leave them to stand for 3 or 4 hours to chill, as per the explanation in number 4. If the water is not cold enough it will not freeze rapidly enough and will leak away through the joins in the plastic, or thaw the ground. The optimum time is a trial and error process but 3 to 4 hours may prove best, so maybe rent a movie or be very patient.



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### **TIME TO GET SERIOUS ABOUT WINTER!**

Sixth, after you have allowed your barrels of water to “chill” simply tip them over one at a time. You may have to break or thaw some ice that has formed at the top of the barrel - don't fill them to the brim. Roll or slide the barrels around to spread the water. You should observe a thin film of water spreading across the plastic which should freeze as it travels.

Seventh, refill the barrels with more water and repeat the chilling and pouring process. Depending on the size of your rink, 4 to 6 barrels should give you a good base of ice. Check for air pockets and rough spots. Burst the air pockets and continue the flooding process until you have 2 to 3 inches of good solid smooth ice.

Now you should be ready to let the aspiring hockey stars or figure skating champions loose on the ice.

To maintain a good ice surface is quite simple. Clear off any snow after a snow fall and then sweep the ice clean with a wide yard broom. If you leave too much snow on the rink you will end up with “pop corn” ice which can be dangerous for the skater.

Periodically flood the rink with your barrels and chilled water. Don't try using water directly from the hose as it can shatter the ice like a piece of glass. It will also burn a hole in the ice.

**SAFETY** - I always insisted that the kids use foam pucks or balls. Regular pucks can damage people, windows and siding nearby. Also, insist on helmets, face guards and protective gear. Also, keep a first aid kit handy along with emergency phone numbers and the parents numbers of the kids using your rink. Also, remember that little kids can get severely chilled and easily frost-bitten so frequent time outs in the warm might be wise and they should be closely monitored.



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## TIME TO GET SERIOUS ABOUT WINTER!

Some backyard rinks end up with flood lights on a post connected to the house by an extension cord. Make sure that the extension cord cannot be trodden on by a sharp skate - this could electrocute someone. Some people install boards and benches. It all contributes to having some great outdoor winter fun. Remember that such activity burns up lots of energy so plenty of hot chocolate should be the order of the day.

The key to a successful backyard rink is to keep it simple and have fun!!! And also be aware that there is no age limit or height limit.....
