Work done well! We all aspire to do our best and present our work in the best possible light. It has been said that "...the mind is an incredible machine that can store, retain and regurgitate facts with astonishing speed and accuracy; until you're standing in Lodge and suddenly find yourself reading from a blank slate." We've all had it happen. Practicing a piece for hours, spaced over multiple days, in preparation for a given event or bit of degree work in Lodge; until it's perfect. Even running through it a couple of extra times on the drive in, only to suddenly find yourself stumped and needing a prompt or two while standing before your Brethren and performing the piece that you 'had-down perfectly.' Thus, understanding the gravity of the situation, and watching another Brother perform a piece with perfection, is always great to see. I've had the opportunity, over the years, to have observed and performed work at both ends of the quality spectrum, but truly admire seeing when work is done well. We are always our own worst critic.

A recent trip to another District Lodge emphasized how beautiful the rubric can be when performed with perfection. Watching younger Brethren, some still coming up through the degrees, taking pieces of the evening's work and pulling it off with perfection was a thing of beauty. Not to just recite the verbiage, but to present the material with a clear and concise oration, fluid and emphasizing the correct pauses and pronunciation, gives credit to the Brother, his mentors and the Lodge in particular. We have all tripped and stumbled to know what it means to have that nod of recognition.





A Masonic Tidbit



In 1877, the body of a male person washed ashore on Lake Ontario, near Jordan (a community in Lincoln, ON). There were certain markings on the body which identified him as a Mason and he was given a fitting burial by the Masons of the District.

A headstone was erected to mark the gravesite and dedicated to "An Unknown Brother"



The original stone had become eroded with the ravages of time and the environment, and was replaced on May 12, 1996 with a generous donation from Heritage Lodge No 703.

Approximately 125 Masons of Niagara District A, their families and friends erected the new monument at Jordan Station Cemetery. The inscription on the tombstone is as follows:"Here lieth the remains of an unknown brother whose body was washed ashore near the residence of Abram Martin esq., Louth, on April 20th,1877.

This tombstone was erected to show that while the deceased had only on his person certain symbols to distinguish him as a freemason, yet were they sufficient to secure for the remains fraternal sympathy and Christian sepulture.


